



Brief history

KOINONIA is an ecumenical organization founded in 1994 by former members of the Ecumenical Center for Documentation and Information (CEDI), an institution that operated between 1974 and 1994. The creation of the new entity was marked by its Assembly of Associates, composed of historical activists in the fight for democracy and affirmation of the values of the Ecumenical Movement in Brazil. The objective of the new organization, in continuity with the ecumenical tradition, was initially to provide services to religious communities, social movements and churches.

At the end of the 1990s, KOINONIA assumed a prominent role among ecumenical organizations in Brazil, strengthening its interventions in the fields of promoting socioenvironmental rights and justice, training popular educators, seeking dignified living conditions for historically and culturally vulnerable populations, emergency action in the face of climate setbacks.

In the 2000s, KOINONIA's development was based on complementary strategies: in the social field, it increased the services provided to popular sectors and expanded institutional alliances and alliances with social movements; and in the ecumenical field, it sought visibility for the ecumenical contribution (national and international) to Brazilian society.

Since then, it has carried out educational and rights promotion actions with vulnerable populations in Rio de Janeiro, São Paulo and Bahia in traditional urban and rural black communities, family farmers, urban and rural youth, and religious movements.

In this context of service to vulnerable communities, women stand out as the most vulnerable group, especially black women, but also with the greatest power to organize and take action against inequalities and the search for rights.

Today, the public engaged in KOINONIA projects is mostly women seeking information and support to fight for their rights.

The rise of fundamentalism drives the need for a more robust and resilient public presence, both due to its religious dimension and the reduction of the space for organized civil society.

The organization is increasingly in demand in the public debate on the role of religions in the Brazilian sociopolitical-environmental context. That is an opportunity to strengthen progressive voices in the religious field, promote progressive ecumenical values and contribute to broader initiatives, in partnership with social movements and political articulations.

TRADITIONAL BLACK PEOPLE COMMUNITIES RIGHTS AND OVERCOMING RACISM

Work with quilombola communities and religious centers of African origin.

Given the growth of fundamentalism, there have been significant cuts in public policies for these communities, in addition to an increase in religious intolerance.

The organization seeks to address these issues in the context of religious racism, covering both racial and religious dimensions, aiming to combat the denial of rights to these communities.

Current work includes strengthening network actions, advocacy, training community leaders, legal and administrative advice, and production of knowledge on these issues.



The rise of fundamentalism in Brazil has led to setbacks in the rights of women and the LGBTQIA+ community.
KOINONIA faces the challenge of discussing these issues in religious communities influenced by fundamentalist views.

Its activities include combating violence against women, training religious women in protection mechanisms, creating listening spaces, producing informative material on combating gender-based violence, and participating in national and international public advocacy initiatives.









Throughout KOINONIA's 31-year history, women have demonstrated greater engagement and capacity for mobilization in fight for rights and social justice. Vulnerable women seek information and training to overcome their condition and recognize the importance of support networks focused on social protection, creating income-generating opportunities and combating racism and misogyny.
